THE FLEA CIRCUS AND GENEALOGY

Peter Bolton, local retired teacher and self-taught family researcher, gave us a fascinating talk on genealogy at the October 21st meeting. Responding to a letter about the origins of Louie Bertoletto, Peter began exhaustive research on whether our L. Bertoletto, who is buried in Port Hope, was the same man who became famous for demonstrations of his Flea Circus. In fact, he might have been the "Andrew Lloyd Weber of Flea Circuses." With resources available on the web, Peter concluded that he was the same man.

Peter Goering brought "his father's nuts" (one slightly bigger than the other) to the meeting. Purchased in Mexico in 1934 as curiosities by his father, the nuts contained tiny dioramas of fleas in costumes.

"Real fleas, guaranteed." "The fleas are dead; they will not come to life." "Dressed by hand by a Mexican widow who gets them from her flea-infested dogs." These were some of the claims accompanying the nuts.

PROBUS DISTRICT I MEETING

Hosted by the Ganaraska Valley Probus Club, District 1 Western Division met on October 28th at the Recreation Centre, Port Hope.

The meeting was presided over by new Director Peter Doyle, who was introduced at our Spring Fling last May. District 1 West consists of 14 Probus Clubs. President Terry Bell and Vice President Catharine Ramsey represented our club.

A discussion took place regarding future Spring Flings. The next one will take place on May 20, 2009 at the Keeler Centre in Colborne. Cobourg Probus Club will host this event. At this early stage, they are planning to issue a set number of tickets to each club based on the size of the membership. By doing this they hope to keep the attendance at a maximum of 600 people. *(NOTE FROM EDITOR: We tried to limit the number to 500 attendees when we hosted Spring Fling in May, but we were still inundated by requests for tickets and ended up with an attendance of 700. People were extremely unhappy with limiting attendance.)*

There was a general discussion on what various clubs pay for hall rentals (we pay \$200 per meeting), annual dues (we charge \$40), meeting fees (we charge \$3) etc. We also discussed what, if any, events we subsidize and whether we pay our speakers. Clubs have different policies on all of the above issues.
