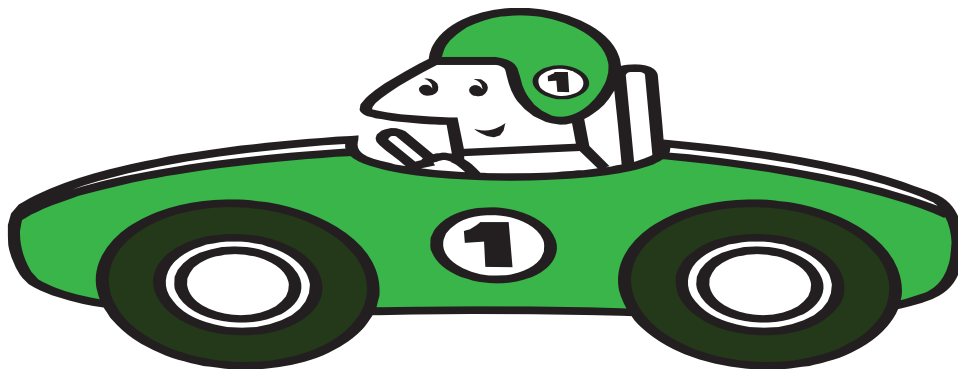

Speaker's Corner

Guinness Is Not Just About Beer

There is no doubt that Northumberland has been discovered. What with all the celebrity locals like a world renowned author and a Governor-General Prize winning poet and the movie types such as Academy Award nominated film director and an actor who adapted his grandfather's WW1 experiences into a successful film, the world has been beating a path to our door. Still with all these personalities their fame was acquired elsewhere, they just live here. But there is one world beater, Rev. Kevin Fast, whose road to celebrity status began right here, on King St., with a local fire truck, offering evidence, if not absolute certainty, to the claim that if you can make it in Cobourg you can make it anywhere.

Kevin explained how simply his journey to world class status began. Eighteen years ago with the Highland Games, he got "hooked on the strength stuff." His horizons widened, asked the Fire Chief, "If he could borrow a fire truck...pull it a bit?" Then as a passing thought, he wondered, "Is that a world record?" He had to investigate, "The Guinness Book had rules and regulations". In 1998 he set a world record, decided to rest on his laurels, "I'm satisfied". In 1999 the idea of two fire trucks came up, "I can do that...make it into Ripley's Believe It Or Not". In 2001 a new challenge, someone dared "to beat his record"; three trucks would make short work of that upstart.

But there would be a permanent solution, perform feats that no one would even consider matching. How about pulling a house on a trailer for Habitat for Humanity or going to China and lifting seven cheerleaders on a platform and hold them aloft for a minute or maybe pulling a Globe-master Cargo plane on the tarmac in Trenton? That last one would require two months of training, gym five days a week, pull a truck up a hill at least



twice a week, and a couple of practice tries, one in the rain before the record breaking effort.

Success has come out of "evolving" his own technique through "trial and error...sticking with what works." Kevin points out that moving a weight through a full range of motion reduces the amount that can be lifted. The secret lies in incremental movements, reducing the distance of the lift increases the potential of the weight that can be moved. As Kevin describes his actions, "I am almost fully laid out, pulling myself along, taking many small steps." And as we all saw the plane moved.

Fame has hardly brought fortune; Kevin still wears the Roman collar, kept his day job. But there still are perks, appearance on *Regis and Kelly*, "travel the world for free with his wife, Switzerland, Italy, Norway, Singapore, and most recently China". He explains, "I never beat a record by a whole lot then they have to invite me back next year...it's a great hobby."

Then there are still prospects. Although Kevin has "lost height", he has been "fortunate, injury free for 18 years". He still trains at the Y now more often with his son, opportunities on the horizon for new records working as a pair. And then, when asked if he was saving any world records for his son to beat, a laughing Kevin replied, "The kid's got an attitude, He thinks he's going to break them all." As Sir Edmund Hillary when asked, "Why climb Everest?" quipped "Because it's there", so it is and so it ever will be, our finest efforts exist but to be bested. Still it would be nice if some would stay in the family.

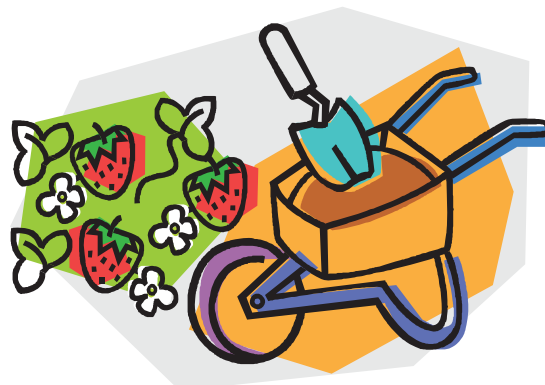
The appropriateness of transplanting now seemed a common concern. Betty said "Yes" to whole host of things that can be moved even now, "flowering bushes, irises, hostas..." She explains, "Flowering shrubs transplanted in early September do better. If you leave it to spring, "Don't transplant in hot weather March and April are better." A personal story would confirm she knows whereof she speaks There was her comment about this bush she had moved three times, "...just couldn't seem to find the right spot for it...husband wanted to know if it was going to be moved again." Moving a Hosta, be prepared, "have an axe ready."
