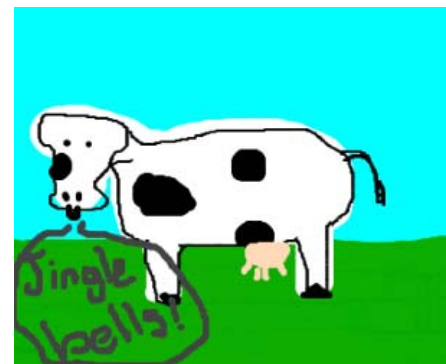

## **PARKWOOD ESTATE TOUR**



On August 14<sup>th</sup>, 24 Probus members were treated to an informative guided tour of Colonel R.S. McLaughlin's Parkwood Estate in Oshawa. The 12-acre grounds (minus one acre taken up by a multi-storey parking garage for the hospital complex) is beautifully landscaped with a number of gardens, the Italian garden reportedly Mrs. McLaughlin's favourite.

The main entrance of the house, built in 1915 shows off a pipe organ, which all five of the McLaughlin's daughters played. A beautiful cantilevered circular staircase topped by a dome on the second floor enhances the acoustics. The 55 room house contains the original family furnishings and is considered a museum. From the 300 year old tapestry in the formal sitting room to the vaulted, hand-painted ceiling in Mrs. McLaughlin's dressing room (shipped from England in one piece weighing more than 2000 lbs.) to the bowling alley with the first automated pin setter, to the indoor pool, billiards room, elevator and private telephone "booth" hidden behind a secret door set in the heavy paneling...there were so many unique and beautiful items to be seen.

The majority of the group enjoyed a lovely lunch in the outdoor pavilion overlooking the fountains of the formal garden.
